SAFE SPORT

Funded by the Government of Canada



Gender equality in sport and safe sport are important issues for Sport Canada. Accordingly, new funding for Canadian sport will be devoted to promoting the following priorities in the years ahead: harassment, abuse and discrimination, concussion, and anti-doping efforts.

The CDSA received funding from Sport Canada totalling \$7,500. In the past year, the CDSA undertook three (3) activities or initiatives for its community as a whole in the following areas:

- Preparing the transition from the independent third party of the CDSA to the Office of the Sport Integrity Commissioner (OSIC)
- Pursuing the project to implement data on a PRIVIT platform (management tool) for athletes and members of national team mission staff

CDSA SPORT AWARDS

These awards are presented every two years during the Deaflympic cycle (summer or winter) to athletes and national teams that have significantly contributed to Deaf sports in Canada.

From April 1, 2021, to March 31, 2023, a total of **240 Canadian athletes** took part in various competitions. There were **15 nominations** in all, and the CDSA awarded three sports prizes in the following categories:

- Best Female Athlete (5 nominees)
- Best Male Athlete (4 nominees)
- Best National Team (6 nominees)

LONG-TERM ATHLETE DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

In 2020, the Alberta Deaf Sports Association (ADSA) and the CDSA signed an agreement to support youths across Canada who wish to participate in sports activities. In the fourth year of a ten-year agreement, the ADSA granted the CDSA an annual sum of \$3,000 for its long-term athlete development (LTAD) projects.
